



GOOD NEIGHBOR FLYER FOR SHORT TERM RENTALS

Welcome to Trinidad!

Short term rentals are a great way to experience Trinidad, and the City hopes you have a wonderful visit. We respectfully ask for your help in being good neighbors to the community you are staying in.

This flyer highlights how you can be a good neighbor during your stay in Trinidad, and provides you with important safety information and contact numbers.

Good Neighbor Guidance:

- Respect the limits on occupancy and visitors at your rental.
- Keep the noise down. Visitors and residents alike have a right to the quiet use and enjoyment of their homes. Any noise after 10:00 p.m. and before 7:00 a.m. should be contained within the rental unit such that it is not heard by neighbors.
- Dogs on Leash - Dogs are required to be on leash at all times when off your rental property, including on the trails and beaches. You are also asked to pick up after your dog. There are several receptacles around town providing "doggy bags" for proper disposal.
- Park in the designated areas on your rental property. If you have visitors, make sure they park in safe and legal public parking spaces that don't block the roads or neighbor driveways. All homes in Trinidad utilize septic systems for wastewater disposal and driving or parking on them can cause serious damage to the system.
- Please stay on designated trails to help protect environmentally sensitive habitats and culturally important areas around town. These include stream corridors, bluffs, beaches and intertidal areas.
- No fires or fireworks on beaches. City ordinances prohibit the collecting or disturbance of marine life.

If you see a seal or sea lion on the beach, stay away from it and keep dogs away. Mother seals and sea lions often leave their young on the beach while foraging for food. If you think an animal is injured, you may call the Humboldt Wildlife Care Center at 707-822-8839 or the Marine Mammal Center at 707-465-6265.

Safety Guidance

Watch your step - Many of the local trails have steep sections and uneven footing. Wear proper footwear and stick to the trails.

Never turn your back on the ocean. Sneaker waves appear without warning, surging high up on the beach with deadly force.

Trinidad is in a very seismically active area. If you are inside and feel the ground shake, get under a sturdy piece of furniture away from windows. If you are outside, move to an open area, watching for falling objects.

If you feel a large earthquake that lasts for a minute or more and causes you to have difficulty standing, move to higher ground immediately and stay there. A tsunami can arrive on our coastline within minutes, and last for hours.
